To assist the reader, an index is provided.

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## INTRODUCTION

The ability to gather information quickly and efficiently is essential for researchers. However, the researcher must spend a great deal of time to search, gather, and review source materials before deciding specifically what is available, and what is appropriate to any particular study.

The Center for Census Use Studies (Bureau of the Census) prepared for the Institute for Water Resources (Army Corps of Engineers) this single reference to identify various programs, services, and data maintained by the Bureau of the Census. This document should also prove useful for anyone engaged in socioeconomic research.



## OVERVIEW

The Bureau is a general purpose statistical agency which collects, tabulates, and publishes a wide variety of statistical data about the people and the economy of the Nation. These data are utilized in the development and evaluation of economic and social programs.

Confidentiality of responses to Census questionnaires is guaranteed by Title 13 of the U.S. Code that prohibits the Bureau from furnishing copies of individual records or issuing any statistics which identify or disclose individual information. This protection also applies to names and addresses.

In addition to its headquarters at Suitland, Maryland, the Bureau includes a Data Preparation Division at Jeffersonville, Indiana, a Personal Census Service Branch at Pittsburgh, Kansas, and 12 regional offices (see Page 81).

The principal functions of the Bureau include: decennial censuses of population and housing\*; quinquennial census of agriculture, State and local governments, manufacturers, mineral industries, commercial fisheries, business, construction industries, and transportation; current surveys which provide information on many of the subjects covered in the censuses at weekly, monthly, quarterly, annual, or other intervals; and compilation of current statistics on U.S. foreign trade, including data on imports, exports, and shipping.

In addition, the Bureau conducts special censuses at the request and expense of State and local government units; publishes estimates and projections of the population; provides current data on population and housing characteristics; and issues current reports on manufacturing,

retail and wholesale trade, selected services, construction, imports and exports, State and local government finances and employment, and other subjects.

The principal products of the Bureau are its printed reports, computer tapes, and special tabulations. It also produces catalogs, guides, and directories which are useful in locating information on specific subjects.

### Data Availability

#### Publications

Data are available in different forms dependent upon the needs and budget of the user. Most of the statistical information needs of data users can be met by the Census Bureau's publication program. In addition, many of the reports are available outside the Bureau from local libraries or from any one of the U.S. Department of Commerce Field Offices located throughout the country (see Page 79). #### Computer Tapes

Some researchers require more detailed information or the flexibility to manipulate the data to suit their particular needs. To meet this need, the Census Bureau also makes available a number of computer tapes.

All computer tapes available to the public are subject to the same confidentiality restrictions imposed upon other Bureau data. The Bureau's tape programs are described on page 18. Additional information is available from:

### Special Tabulations

While data from published reports or computer tapes are usually sufficient for the needs of most researchers, the Census Bureau will provide special tabulations of data prepared to user specifications at the actual cost of the project incurred by the Bureau. Costs include expenditures for planning the special work, as well as charges for overhead expenses. Generally, special tabulations become part of the public domain six months after they are released, and may be obtained for the cost of reproduction. ### Catalogs and Guides

To assist data users in locating and keeping abreast of new publications or programs, the Census Bureau produces a number of catalogs and guides. The most current listing of publications and program announcements are found in the Bureau of the Census Catalog.

The Bureau of the Census Catalog is issued each quarter and cumulated to an annual volume. Between quarterly issues, a monthly supplement is published. The catalog is divided into two parts. Part I describes reports from censuses and current surveys; Part II describes computer tapes, punched cards, and special tabulations available in photocopies, microform, or tape. The price and availability of each document or item are indicated in the catalog. The catalog is available at most libraries or through the U.S. Government Printing Office.

For those interested specifically in reports or computer tapes from the 1970 census, two companion volumes are available: Index to Selected 1970 Census Reports and Index to 1970 Census Summary Tapes. Each index is thoroughly cross-classified. Both publications are available for inspection at any of the Department of Commerce District Offices.

### Limitations of Census Data

When working with any data, the data user should be aware of any data limitations or constraints. Each data-based Bureau report routinely includes discussions of terminology, population surveyed or enumerated, reliability of estimates, sources of error, any allocations or comparability with reports or data, definition of terms, and other information important to the understanding of the data displayed. In addition, if a publication is based on a major recurring survey or census, a general description of that survey or census is also given, providing the researcher a broader understanding of the relevancy or importance of the data at hand.

In addition to the above, the researcher should also consult the introduction to a report for the geographic level of which the data are presented (whether State, county or tract, etc.), as these may differ from report to report and program to program.

Finally, correction notes in the front of Bureau reports should be examined. Errors discovered in data after a report has been compiled, but before it is printed, are reported in a correction note at the beginning of the report.

### Undercount

Underenumeration in the United States for the 1970 census has been estimated at about 2.5 percent. The chart below shows the estimated national rates of underenumeration by the 1970 Census of Population:

Recognizing the potential significance of undercoverage of State and local populations for many public and private programs, several alternative series of corrected figures have been prepared for states to evaluate the effect such undercounting might have on funds disbursement and political representation. Those wishing a more detailed explanation of undercounts and examples of various adjustment methods should review the Current Population Reports, Special Studies, Series P-23, number 56, "Coverage of Population in the 1970 Census and Some Implications for Public Programs," August 1975, and "Developmental Estimates of the Coverage of the Population of States in the 1970 Census: Demographic Analysis," CPS, Special Studies, P-23, number 65, December 1977.

### Currency of 1970 Census Data

Since the census of population and housing is taken only every ten years, many changes that may have occurred in the characteristics of areas since enumeration would not be reflected in these data. In the case of small areas, changes such as

new highway or residential construction may have had a dramatic impact on the characteristics of the neighborhoods in which they are located.

Data from decennial censuses serve an important function as benchmarks rather than indications of trends and activities. As each succeeding year passes from the decennial census, other Bureau programs, such as current surveys, special censuses, and population estimates and projections, fill the data gaps between censuses. Although, not as detailed or comprehensive as the decennial census, these programs provide valuable information otherwise unavailable on a systematic and recurring basis.

### Sampling

Although everyone in the United States is to be enumerated every 10 years, only five questions in the 1970 Census of Population were asked of all individuals. These "Complete Count" or "100 percent" items were relationship to household head, sex, race, age, and marital status. These items permit an accurate count of persons as required by the Constitution to determine Congressional representation.

Other information was also obtained from questions asked of only a sample of the population. Statistical sampling methods permit the development of more data about an area at a much lower cost of obtaining it and with less burden upon the individual being enumerated. Although relatively fewer individuals are questioned to reflect the characteristics of an area, the size of the sample does, however, restrict the use of data for small geographic units.

In addition to the five questions asked of everyone, other questions were asked of two sample populations: certain questions were asked of 15 percent of the population and other questions of a 5 percent sample population. In addition to these two sample populations,

some questions used for one sample were also asked on the other resulting in a 20 percent (combined) sample. The table on page 9, shows the various data items in the 1970 Census of Population and the samples from which they were drawn.

The same sampling techniques were also used to obtain information about housing units. Specific housing questions were asked of 5, 15, and 100 percent of the population; questions asked of both the 5 and 15 percent sample resulted in a 20 percent sample. The table on page 14 displays the housing items and samples from which they were drawn.

Current surveys conducted by the Census Bureau also employ sophisticated sampling techniques to obtain a representative sample of the entire national population. Since statistics reported from these surveys are based on samples, data may differ somewhat from figures that would otherwise have been obtained from a complete census; consequently particular care should be exercised in interpreting data based on relatively small numbers as well as small differences between figures. As with any survey work, results are subject to errors in response and sampling variability.

In any data interpretation, the researcher should consult definitions and methodological notes of each survey report and publication within a given series. Even though every effort to assure the accuracy of each survey is made, many changes may have occurred over time in the sample size of the population to be surveyed or the survey methodology. For example, the method used to impute or allocate unanswered questions of the Current Population Survey changed no less than three times during the 1960's. A careful review of technical notes prior to using any data will provide a better understanding of the data displayed and

possibly prevent error or wasted time when using the data.

### Census Geography

Census data are tabulated for specific geographic areas ranging from a single city block to a region composed of several states or as totals at the national level. Although much data are presented for small geographic areas, it should be noted that in order to protect individual confidentiality not all data are released. This is especially true for census blocks and rural areas. Generally, the larger or more densely populated an area, the greater the number and detail of the data that are made available.

In addition to census-defined geographic areas described below, there are locally defined areas for which census data may be requested. These special purpose areas include, for example, school and health districts, police and fire precincts, and traffic zones. Unfortunately, data comparisons of one special purpose area with another may be difficult at best and impossible at worst due to boundary overlaps.

Beginning with the United States, the following pages describe the principal geographic areas for which data are tabulated by the Census Bureau. In many cases, Bureau publications include maps of the area(s) for which data are presented to assist the researchers.

#### United States

National totals include data from all 50 States and the District of Columbia. Unless otherwise specified in the publication, national totals do not include Puerto Rico or the outlying areas of the Canal Zone, Guam, Samoa, the Virgin Islands or the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands.

#### Regions and Divisions

Regions and divisions are large geographic areas composed of States to provide summary figures intermediate between national and individual State totals. Each of the four regions is composed of two or three divisions.

#### States


Statistics for each State are made available from each census and from most surveys. Statistics are also published separately for the District of Columbia.

#### Standard Consolidated Statistical Areas (SCSA)

Standard consolidated statistical areas constitute a recent geographic classification. As of October 1975, 13 SCSA's had been designated by the Office of Management and Budget. These 13 areas represent one-third of the total population of the United States. Each SCSA contains at least two standard metropolitan statistical areas (SMSA's), one of which must have a population of one million or more. The adjoining SMSA(s) must be related to it by continuously developed high density population corridors and an inter-metropolitan community of workers.

#### Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas (SMSA)

Generally, a standard metropolitan statistical area consists of a county containing at least one city (or twin cities) of 50,000 inhabitants or more, plus as many adjacent counties as are metropolitan in character and socially integrated with the central city. The Department of Commerce identifies one or more central cities for each SMSA and uses their names to identify the SMSA. Some SMSA's, such as Washington, D.C. - Maryland - Virginia SMSA, may cross state lines. As of December 1977, there were 281 standard metropolitan statistical areas.



rural territory. The urbanized area population is sometimes divided into those within the central city and those in the balance of the area (the urban fringe).

### Urban and Rural Areas

The urban population definition used for the 1970 census was all persons living in an urbanized area (defined above) and in places of 2,500 or more inhabitants outside urbanized areas; populations not classified as urban constitute the rural population.

### Counties

Counties are the primary political and administrative divisions of states with the following exceptions: Louisiana, where county equivalents are called parishes; Alaska, where 29 census divisions have been created as county equivalents; and Puerto Rico, where counties are referred to as municipios. In addition to the previous exceptions, there are also cities which are equated to county status. These include 40 cities in Virginia; the District of Columbia; and independent cities of Columbus, Georgia; Baltimore, Maryland; St. Louis, Missouri; and Carson City, Nevada.

### Minor Civil Divisions (MCD)

The minor civil division is the primary political and administrative subdivision of a county in 29 states. The most common type of MCD is the township, although towns, precincts, and magisterial districts are considered MCD's in some States.

### Census County Divisions (CCD)

Census county divisions are statistical subdivisions of a county in 21 states in which the minor civil division is not a suitable unit for presenting census data. This is a relatively permanent statistical area defined by physical features or administrative boundaries.

### Urbanized Areas (UA)

An urbanized area consists of a central city, or cities, and surrounding closely settled territory. This classification provides a better separation of urban and rural populations in the vicinity of large cities. Urbanized areas differ from SMSA's by excluding rural portions of the counties comprising an SMSA or those places which are urban in character but are separated from the densely populated areas surrounding the central city by

### Enumeration Districts (ED)

An enumeration district has an average population size of approximately 800 individuals. The smallest geographic unit for which data are tabulated in areas where no blocks are identified, the ED is redefined with each census for use as an administrative unit for control of census operations.

### Places

A place is an incorporated or unincorporated concentration of population. Incorporated places are political units such as cities, towns, villages, or boroughs with the following exceptions: boroughs in Alaska, towns in New England, and townships in New Jersey and Pennsylvania which are considered to be minor civil divisions. Unincorporated places are densely settled population centers without legally defined corporate limits. Boundaries for these areas are drawn by the Bureau of the Census to include, to the extent possible, all the densely settled area.

### Census Tracts

Census tracts are small, relatively permanent areas into which large cities and adjacent areas have been subdivided to provide small-area statistics. Tracts are designed to be relatively homogeneous in socioeconomic characteristics, though these conditions may change over time. The average tract has about 4,000 inhabitants and are used extensively by local organizations to tabulate their own statistics. 1970 census data are published in a separate tract report series. SMSA's created since the 1970 census may or may not be completely tracted.

### Block Groups

Block groups are combinations of contiguous blocks to form a subdivision of census tracts. Block groups generally

have a population of 1000 inhabitants.

### Blocks

Blocks are generally well-defined pieces of land, bounded by streets, rail tracks, streams or some other natural or manmade feature. Blocks are identified in all urbanized areas and some selected areas. Block level statistics are tabulated for all urbanized areas within SMSA's.

### Special Purpose Areas

Some census data have been tabulated for areas defined for special purposes. For example, data are available by school districts as a result of a special tabulation. In addition, the Census Bureau is preparing to tabulate 1980 census data by defined neighborhoods for those organizations that qualify and wish to participate in this new program. ## DECENNIAL CENSUS

The decennial census provides a vast amount of detailed information especially useful in showing the characteristics of States and smaller geographic units, as well as analyzing specific subjects such as marital status or education of the population. Taken once every 10 years since 1790, the census of population is the oldest of the censuses conducted by the Bureau. Beginning in 1940, a census of housing has been taken every 10 years in conjunction with the census of population.

Although data from the decennial censuses are less timely than data available from surveys, the wide scope and continuity of the decennial census data, and the availability of data for small geographic areas, can provide the basic information needed by researchers.

Published data from the decennial census can be grouped into three major report categories:

- Population census reports (PC series)
- Housing census reports (HC series)
- Joint population and housing census reports (PHC series)

In addition to publications from the 1970 census, data are also available on computer tape.

### 1970 Census of Population

In the 1970 census, three types of questionnaires were used throughout the country: one that contained five popu-

lation questions asked of everyone, a second that asked 20 questions of 15 percent of the population, and a third that asked 19 questions of 5 percent of the population. Twelve items common to both the 5 and 15 percent samples resulted in a combined 20 percent sample. The following table shows the questions asked and the sample they were drawn from. The years in parentheses indicate the year the item was first included to assist the researcher who might wish to establish trend data over a period of decades.

The second reason to collect this data is for future verification of age, citizenship, etc. This information is stored under the strictest of security measures to protect the confidentiality of an individual and is only obtainable upon the individual's request.

The results obtained from the items above are printed in two volumes with an open-ended supplementary report series: Characteristics of the Population (Volume 1), Subject Reports (Volume 2), and the Supplementary Report Series.

Volume 1, Characteristics of the Population

Volume 1, also referred to as PC(1), represents a major part of the information collected from the decennial census of population. Statistics are presented in varying detail for each State dependent upon the level of geographic detail. This volume consists of 58 separately bound books ("Parts"). Each part represents a specific geographic area: Part 1, the United States; Parts 2 through 52 for the 50 States and the District of Columbia numbered in alphabetical order; Part 53, Puerto Rico; and Parts 54 through 58 (appearing together in one book) for Guam, Virgin Islands, American Samoa, Canal Zone, and the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands. Each part contains four chapters:

- A: Number of Inhabitants
- B: General Population Characteristics
- C: General Social and Economic Characteristics
- D: Detailed Characteristics

Chapter A, "Number of Inhabitants," is limited to strict population counts. It shows the number of residents of the

State and counties (or equivalent nomenclature) classified by urban and rural residence and by size of place; and the number of inhabitants of county subdivisions, incorporated and unincorporated places, urbanized areas, standard metropolitan statistical areas, and other selected areas of the State.

For comparison purposes, counts for both the 1960 and 1970 censuses with percentage change are also shown. Included in this chapter are maps and charts, land areas in square miles, population density, populations of annexed areas, and results of any special censuses that might have been taken between 1960 and 1970.

Chapter B, "General Population Characteristics," presents general population characteristics with more detailed information by age, race, and sex. Data presented in this chapter come from the 100 percent items collected from each person enumerated. This chapter also includes cross-classified data not found elsewhere in addition to historical data such as State population changes since 1900.

Chapter C, "General Social and Economic Characteristics," represents data collected on a sample basis. Items displayed include place of birth, mother tongue, years of school completed, place of work, and income. Data are presented for the State, counties, SMSA's, urbanized areas, and urban places of 2,500 or more inhabitants. Dependent upon the size of minority populations, many tables are repeated for black and Spanish language populations for selected counties and selected places of 100,000 inhabitants or more.

Chapter D, "Detailed Characteristics," presents statistics for large areas based on data obtained from sample populations. Because of the larger areas involved, much more detail is possible than is

permitted in Chapter C. Data are displayed for SMSA's of 250,000 or greater inhabitants and the central cities of these SMSA's.

#### Volume 2, Subject Reports

Volume 2, also referred to as PC(2), consists of 40 reports grouped by 10 major subject headings. Because of the specificity of each report, the researcher must consult the report of interest to determine the geographic level for which the data are available. Supplementary Reports

The Supplementary Report Series, also referred to as PC(S1), is an open-ended series of reports that provide special-use statistics. Much of the data are special compilations which could not be accommodated in the regular final reports. These series also include selected tables from large reports, thus permitting wider distribution of often requested data in an inexpensive format.

A similar report, PC(S1)-105: Poverty Status in 1969 and 1959 of Persons and Families, for States, SMSA's, Central Cities, and Counties: 1970 and 1960," was also compiled. This report is the first with poverty data covering a 10-year time span for many local areas. It includes previously unpublished 1970 census data on school-age children in poverty families and on the aged poor.

Volume I, Housing Characteristics for State, Cities, and Counties

Volume I, series number HC(1), consists of 58 separately bound "parts;" the numbering of each part parallels Volume I of the census of population, i.e., each part represents a specific geographic area: Parts 1, the United States; Parts 2 through 52 for the 50 States and the District of Columbia numbered in alphabetical order; Part 53, Puerto Rico; and Parts 54 through 58 (bound as a single volume) for Guam, Virgin Islands, American Samoa, Canal Zone, and the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands. Each part contains two chapters: A, "General Housing Characteristics," and B, "Detailed Housing Characteristics."

Chapter A, "General Housing Characteristics," contains data by urban and rural State areas, counties, SMSA's, and urbanized areas and places of 1,000 inhabitants or more. Data presented in this chapter include:

#### Volume 2, Metropolitan Housing Characteristics

The second volume of 1970 housing data, the HC(2) series, consists of one report for each of the 243 SMSA's identified in the 1970 census, the four SMSA's in Puerto Rico, and a U.S. summary. These reports provide data for each place of 50,000 inhabitants or more. Data include:

#### Volume 3, Block Statistics

Volume 3, series HC(3), consists of 278 reports including data for approximately 1.7 million individual census blocks. Included in this series are reports for communities which were outside census-defined urbanized areas, but had contracted with the Census Bureau to provide block statistics at the locality's expense. In addition to statistics included in other housing series, Volume 3 reports also include the number of housing units that:

were owner or renter occupied  
showed Negro head of households  
showed more than one person per room

#### Volume 4, Components of Inventory Change

"Components of Inventory Change," the HC(4) series, consists of 16 reports: one report for the United States and the four census-defined regions, and separate reports for each of 15 selected SMSA's. Statistics include new construction, conversions, mergers, demolitions, and other additions or losses.

#### Volume 5, Residential Finance

"Residential Finance," HC(5), presents data in a single volume based on a sample survey conducted in the spring of 1971. This volume is limited to those who wish data at the national and census-region level. Statistics are given regarding financing of private nonfarm residential properties including mortgage debt, manner of property acquisition, and homeowner expenses.

Volume 6, Plumbing Facilities and Estimates of Dilapidated Housing


Also contained in one volume at the national level, Volume 6, HC(6), are data on "substandard" housing units. The data are based upon selected criteria to provide estimates of inadequate housing and housing facilities.

Volume 7, Subject Reports

"Subject Reports" consists of nine reports. The series HC(7), contains detailed information, generally at the national or regional level. Among the subjects covered are housing characteristics by household composition, housing of minority groups and senior citizens, and households in mobile homes.

Supplementary Reports

This series, HC(S1), is an open-ended series of reports which present housing data and special tabulations which could not be included in the regular final reports. In addition to previously unpublished data, selected tables from the large reports are included. Over 20 reports currently comprise the supplementary housing report series.



Joint Population and Housing Reports

There are three series that comprise the "Joint Population and Housing Reports": Census Tracts, PHC(1); Gen-

eral Demographic Trends for Metropolitan Areas, 1960-1970, PHC(2); and Employment Profiles of Selected Low-Income Areas, PHC(3).

Census Tracts

This series, PHC(1), contains 241 reports, each relating to a particular SMSA in the United States and Puerto Rico and, in some cases, certain areas adjacent to the SMSA. Tables include population and housing data for the total SMSA, the component counties and places of 25,000 or more inhabitants of the SMSA, as well as tract level data. Separate tables are also included for Negro and Spanish populations for those tracts which have a population of 400 or more of the particular group. As with most census publications, each report contains an outline map of the area data that are displayed.

General Demographic Trends for Metropolitan Areas, 1960-1970

This series, PHC(2) consists of a national summary report and one report for each State and the District of Columbia. Data are presented for the State and for SMSA's and their central cities and constituent counties. Comparative statistics for 1960 and 1970 are shown for population counts by age and race and housing items such as tenure, plumbing facilities, value, and contract rent.

Employment Profiles of Selected Low-Income Areas

The PHC(3) series represents detailed socioeconomic data derived from the Census Employment Survey. This survey was designed to obtain more detailed information than was possible from the regular census. This series is composed

of 76 reports covering selected low-income areas in 51 cities, seven rural areas, and one Indian reservation, with a U.S. summary.

The survey was modeled in part after an earlier survey - the 1968-70 Urban Employment Survey - conducted in the poverty areas of six major cities.\*

Each report provides statistics on such items as job tenure, annual work experience, annual earnings and income, weekly earnings of full-time wage and salary workers by age and sex, fixed monthly income and expenses. Some housing data such as value of house, rent, and number of rooms are also available. Reports are available for the cities listed below with their associated report number.



### Census Tape Series and Special Tabulations

More information than is found in printed reports is available in the form of computer tapes. All computer tapes and publications available to the public are based upon the basic record tapes which contain the individual responses to census questionnaires. Although these basic record tapes are not available to the public, the tapes derived from them can be obtained for the Bureau's cost of reproduction. For those without the necessary means to process these tapes, two alternatives exist: either the Bureau can prepare special tabulations according to user-specified requirements, or the data user can have census processing centers tabulate data. These options are discussed later (page 20, for Bureau tabulations and page 49, for census pro-

cessing centers). As with all census data, individual identifiers have been removed to ensure confidentiality.



Two computer tape series are available for purchase: Public Use Summary Tapes and Public Use Sample Tapes. These tape series cover geographic areas from the national level to areas as small as city blocks. Data may be summarized similar to decennial census publications or may represent sample data which may be cross-tabulated.

### Public Use Summary Tapes

The summary tape series consists of six "counts" numbered 1 through 6. Each count represents a specific geographic level and census sample size. For example, the third count contains information collected on a 100 percent basis at the block level while the fifth count contains information for zip code areas on 5, 15, or 20 percent sample basis. With the exception of the fifth count, tapes are arranged by State.

The table on the following page summarizes the general geographic level and sample size from which the data were drawn.

Because of the greater geographic detail and data available, counts four, five, and six provide the most useful information and greatest flexibility for cross tabulations. Summary tapes

are available for each State, but usually more than one reel of tape per State per count will be required. At the time of this writing, the cost for each reel is \$80.

Technical documentation is included with the purchase of the tapes or it may be purchased separately. The documentation for each count includes descriptions of the tables contained on the tapes in addition to tape specifications and layout. A corresponding publication is available to those researchers wishing a description of the summary tape series arranged alphabetically by data item with corresponding tape reference and item number. This publication, Index to 1970 Census Summary Tapes, also provides a section with cross-references by topic.

#### Public Use Sample Tapes

The sample tape series consists of six tapes, each containing sample records for 1 percent of the population (approximately 2 million individuals). Data are limited to either the 15 or 5 percent sample records by one of three geographic levels: (1) county groups (including all SMSA's over 250,000 inhabitants); (2) States; or (3) neighborhood characteristics.

Because of the geographic level and the small sample, Public Use Sample Tapes are limited to general comparisons and do not allow for in-depth examination of specific areas.

A detailed description of the Public Use Sample Tapes and their technical

documentation are available in the publication, Public Use Samples of Basic Records From the 1970 Census. Further information concerning this tape series may be requested from the Data User Services Division below.

#### Special Tabulations

Special tabulations are available from the Bureau of the Census on a cost-reimbursable basis. Tabulations are performed by the Bureau using the requestor's specifications. Special tabulations are subject to the same legal safeguards placed on all census data to ensure confidentiality.

Geographic areas for which special tabulations can be made available are limited to information contained in 5 and 15 percent sample basic records. Dependent upon the item(s) to be included in the tabulations, suppression may occur when the reporting units become too small. All expenses incurred in the processing of special tabulations are incurred by the requesting customer. Subject to a limited number of special reasons, results of special tabulations are made available to the public at the cost of reproduction.

On April 1, 1980, the twentieth decennial census of the United States will be taken. Because of the importance of data from the decennial censuses, researchers should keep abreast of the Bureau's efforts to improve the collection, coverage, processing, and

#### Mid-Decade Census

On October 17, 1976, the President signed into law legislation requiring a mid-decade census of population beginning in 1985. Public Law 94-521 which amends the census code, title 13, provides for a mid-decade census; strengthens existing confidentiality provisions relating to the Bureau's census and survey records; encourages the use of data-collection techniques which minimize public reporting burden; and removes the jail sentence but retains fines as possible penalties for refusal to answer or willfully giving false answers in mandatory censuses and surveys.

In approving this legislation, the Congress intentionally avoided establishing by law the scope and content of the mid-decade census. Rather, the legislation is flexible so that as the time approaches for detailed plans to be drawn, the Bureau of the Census may take into account data needs as seen

for 1985. The Congress clearly intended that the law does not require that the mid-decade census duplicate the decennial census, provided the certain basic objectives are met--updates of characteristics along with population totals, particularly for the distribution of Federal funds to State and local governments, and the administration of Federal program benefits to various segments of the population.

The law specifically prohibits the use of mid-decade census results for apportioning the House of Representatives or delineating congressional districts. The Congress also anticipates that the mid-decade program would be designed to satisfy some of the statistical needs now met through special intercensal surveys. To the extent that this objective can be achieved, a mid-decade census could include inquiries on subjects which are now contained in special-purpose surveys thereby reducing the need for or the frequency of such surveys.



RECURRING CENSUSES

In addition to the decennial censuses, the Bureau of the Census conducts the following censuses in five-year intervals:

- Economic Censuses
- Census of Agriculture
- Census of Governments


Economic Censuses

Economic censuses are taken every 5 years ending in "2" and "7". In 1972 the economic census covered approximately 5 million establishments. The economic censuses are composed of the censuses of:

- retail trade
- wholesale trade
- selected service industries
- construction industries
- manufacturers
- mineral industries
- transportation

In addition to the United States, the economic censuses include Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands, and Guam. Both individual establishments and firms which hold several establishments under common ownership are counted.


With the exception of the census of transportation, the scope and tabulations of the economic censuses are defined on the basis of the Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) system. The SIC defines the Nation's economic activities by ten broad industrial divisions; these divisions are then further subdivided by major group, industry sub-groups, and detailed industry as the following example illustrates:



The use of the SIC system facilitates analysis and comparability of statistical data among all organizations interested in economic studies.

### Census of Agriculture

The census of agriculture is the primary source of comprehensive data about farm products and the agriculture economy on a nationwide basis. This census is taken every five years ending in "4" and "9". (After the 1978 census, census will be taken in years ending in "2" and "7".)


### Census of Governments

Conducted every five years ending in "2" and "7", a census of governments is taken on the activities of individual governments such as counties, municipalities and townships, and their special governmental units. These governmental units include school districts, housing authorities and bridge commissions.

Information generally covered includes:

governmental organization  
taxable property values  
public employment  
governmental finance

In addition to published reports, data are also available on computer tape.





## SURVEYS

In addition to the censuses taken by the Census Bureau, the Bureau also conducts surveys on a recurring or one-time basis. Many of the recurring or special surveys are undertaken for other Federal agencies, State and local governments, and private organizations. Data are collected not only through sample surveys, but also from records kept for administrative purposes by other government bodies. For example, the Bureau summarizes and publishes data about building permits in its C-40 report series. The collection of these permit data is then used by the Bureau in the design of a sample for obtaining additional information on construction activity.

Surveys cover items regarding population, housing, economic activities, and governments. Additional surveys conducted for Federal agencies on a cost-reimbursable basis have included consumer expenditures, crime, health, and social services. A list of current surveys and sponsoring Federal agencies is provided on pages 35 to 37.

### Current Population Surveys

The Current Population Survey (CPS) has been conducted monthly since 1940. The survey is funded jointly by the Bureaus of Census and Labor Statistics to obtain monthly labor force statistics. Analysis of the labor force data is done by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and published in monthly press releases and Employment and Earnings, a monthly publication of the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The survey provides information on the personal characteristics of the labor force including age, race, sex, education, and marital and ethnic status. Statistics on occupation, industry, and class of worker are also obtained in addition to

those data for individuals outside the labor force.

In addition to its role of gathering labor statistics, the CPS also is used to obtain data on a variety of subjects relating to the general population. In most months of the year, a supplemental inquiry is included in the survey. These supplements may be recurring or single-time supplements conducted for a special purpose. Supplements may be sponsored by other Federal agencies or by the Bureau of the Census itself.

The following lists 1977 supplements (those marked "\*" are recurring supplements):

Survey of Earnings--Sponsored by the Bureau of Labor Statistics to obtain information on earnings for employed wage and salary workers.

- March 1977

\*Annual Demographic Supplement--Sponsored annually by the Bureau of the Census and the Bureau of Labor Statistics to obtain information on work experience by weeks employed full- or part-time, income, weeks unemployed, major reason for not working, and industry and occupation of longest job during the previous calendar year, migration within the country since March 1, 1975, household composition, family characteristics, educational attainment, and some housing characteristics.

- April 1977 - There were two surveys:

(1) Survey of Swine Flu Immunization--Sponsored by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare to obtain data measuring the extent of protection

against the swine flu, type of immunization received, and place of immunization. Also measured was the incidence of diabetes and chronic heart, kidney, and lung conditions.

(2) Survey of Food Stamp Reciprocity--Sponsored by the Department of Agriculture to obtain information on the number of households who purchased or received food stamps during the previous 15 months and the value and amount paid for food stamps in the most recent month since January 1977. Data also was collected on household participation in the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) program and family income for March 1977.

● May 1977

\* Survey of Multiple Jobholding, Premium Pay, and Job Search of the Employed--Sponsored by the Bureau of Labor Statistics to obtain information on the characteristics of multiple jobholders and the incidence of premium rates of pay for "at work" wage and salary employees who worked more than 40 hours at one job. In addition, information was obtained on the beginning and ending times of work for wage and salary workers who worked during survey week, usual days and hours worked, weekly and hourly earnings, and labor union membership for all employed and recently (within past 5 months) unemployed wage and salary workers. Data were also gathered on job search activities of the employed, including the methods and reason for the search.

● June 1977

Survey of Birth Expectations, Fertility, and Child Care--The birth expectations and fertility questions are sponsored by the Bureau of the Census to obtain information for married women 14-49 years old and unmarried women 18-49 years old regarding the total number of children they have borne, the data of birth of their

first child, and the data of birth of their most recent child. Married women 14-44 years old and unmarried women 18-44 years old will be asked if they expect to have (more) children, and if so, the number expected and the expected year of birth of their next child. The child care section is sponsored by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare to obtain information necessary to analyze the relationship between employment, fertility, and type of child care used by mothers with children less than 5 years old.

Survey of Food Stamp and School Lunch Program Reciprocity--Sponsored by the Department of Agriculture to obtain information on the number of households who purchased or received food stamps during the first 7 months of 1977 and the value and amount paid for food stamps in the most recent month of receipt. This section of the survey is one in a series of similar surveys conducted since August 1974. Information will also be obtained for the September 1976-June 1977 school year on the proportion of elementary and secondary school students who ate a complete plate lunch at school and their participation in the school lunch program, and the reasons the other students did not eat a school-prepared lunch.

● September 1977

\*National Immunization Survey--Sponsored by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare to obtain current data on individuals 14 years and older as to the extent of their protection against various types of influenza and their incidence of diabetes and chronic heart, kidney, and lung conditions. Information will also be gathered from children

Less than 14 years regarding their protection against various types of influenza and against measles, mumps, tetanus, etc. In addition, information will be gathered on the amount of protection individuals under 20 years old have against polio.

● October 1977

\*School Enrollment Surveys--Sponsored jointly by the Bureau of the Census and the Bureau of Labor Statistics to provide up-to-date information on regular school enrollment at various levels, junior or regular college attendance, and data on high school graduation.

● December 1977

Survey of Farm Wage Workers--Sponsored by the United States Department of Agriculture to obtain information for 1977 on total farm work days and wages, nonfarm work days and wages, major activity during the year, and migratory status.

Labor Statistics from the CPS are published monthly by the Bureau of Labor Statistics in Employment and Earnings and in Monthly Labor Review.

Population Characteristics

This Series, P-20, has been published on a regular basis since 1946. Data are presented for the population as a whole and for ethnic groups on fertility, mobility, residence, education, income, marital status, family status, and number and composition of households. Reports are also published at varying intervals on metropolitan growth, fertility, and voter participation.

This series can be grouped according to the following subject areas:

- Educational Attainment
- Characteristics of Persons, Families and Households
- Fertility
- Mobility Status of Population
- Residence
- Voters and Voting

Special Studies

P-23 is the designation for this report series. Reports are issued on methods, concepts, or data of a specialized nature periodically as data are developed.

Population Estimates and Projections

Reports in the P-25 series provide annual estimates of the population.

Initiated in 1947, estimates include for the United States: total population, components of changes, age, race, and sex; regions, divisions, States, Puerto Rico, and outlying areas: total population, components of changes, and age groups; and selected metropolitan areas and their component counties; total population and components of change.

#### Federal-State Cooperative Programs for Population Estimates\*

Population Estimates in the P-26 series are the result of a program to develop and publish state-prepared estimates of the population using uniform procedures. Estimates for counties are consistent with those prepared for the Bureau in the P-25 series. State agencies responsible for these estimates are listed on page 61. #### Annual Housing Survey


The Annual Housing Survey, results reported in series H-150, is a joint undertaking of the Bureau of the Census and the Department of Housing and Urban Development. The survey covers the following items:

number and characteristics of residential living units  
measures of losses and new construction  
presence of plumbing facilities  
frequency of mechanical and utility breakdowns in units  
characteristics of recent movers  
indicators of physical condition of units  
neighborhood conditions  
financial characteristics  
characteristics of occupants

The Annual Housing Survey consists of two parts: a national sample of housing units from urban and rural areas whose residents are interviewed every year, and metropolitan area samples from 60 standard metropolitan statistical areas, one-third of which are examined in detail every third year.

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\*The P-26 series has introduced a new feature: computer maps indicating State counties with percent change in population from 1970 to 1976.



Four reports are published in the H-150 series:

- A. General Housing Characteristics for the United States and Regions
- B. Indicators of Housing and Neighborhood Quality for the United States and Regions

#### Housing Vacancy Survey

The Housing Vacancy Survey is the source of vacancy rates and characteristics of vacant units. Data are selected on the number of rooms; presence or absence of plumbing facilities, number of units in the building, and the amount of rent or current value of property.

Series H-111, Housing Vacancies, consists of four press releases, and quarterly and annual reports.

#### Survey of Market Absorption

This survey provides data on the rate at which nonsubsidized, unfurnished,

privately financed units in buildings with five or more units rented (absorbed).

The sample is derived from buildings reported as completed in a sample of building permits obtained from the Housing Starts Survey.

The reports from this survey comprise series H-130, Market Absorption of Apartments. Data include characteristics of units such as rents, sizes of apartments, number of bedrooms, and length of time units are vacant. Reports are issued quarterly for the United States and annually for the U.S. and regions.

#### Economic Surveys

In addition to the economic censuses taken every five years, the Bureau also conducts periodic economic surveys. These surveys cover three major economic areas: business, construction, and industry.

#### Current Business Reports

The series of reports that comprise the Current Business Report series are based on samples drawn to primarily represent the Nation as a whole. Depending on the specific report, information is made available weekly, monthly, quarterly, annually, or on a seasonal basis.

### County Business Patterns

An annual publication, County Business Patterns provides statistics on first quarter Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) taxable payroll, and March 12 pay period employment by industrial classification and county location. Data are derived primarily from information reported on Treasury Form 941 (Schedule A) supplemented by a special survey of multi-location companies. Summary statistics are included on a number of employees, first quarter and total annual payroll, number of establishments and number of establishments by employment size/class. Approximately 800 detailed business categories based on the Standard Industrial Classification

are covered. Data are available for the U.S. total, individual states, SMSA's and individual counties.

Prior to 1974, County Business Patterns did not include annual payroll data, thereby eliminating seasonal operation trends.

County Business Patterns is a joint effort between the Social Security Administration and the Census Bureau to update classifications of reporting units in addition to maintaining comparability and consistency with other Bureau statistics. In addition to the published report, data are also available on computer tape.

### Current Industrial Reports

This report series presents data for approximately 5000 products representing more than one-third of all U.S. manufacturing.

Data are presented for the U.S. as a whole for the following industries (based on the 2-digit major groupings of the SIC code):

- processed foods
- textile mill products
- apparel and leather
- lumber, furniture, and paper products
- chemical, rubber, and plastics
- stone, clay, and glass products
- primary metals
- intermediate metal products
- machinery and equipment

Reports are issued monthly, quarterly and annually.

### Annual Survey of Manufacturers

This survey is taken for the four years between each census of manufacturers. The survey presents basic statistics on key measures of manufac-

turing activities for industries and geographic areas. The survey covers all large manufacturing plants and a sample of smaller ones.

Geographic areas for which data are published include divisions, states, selected SMSA's, and large industrial counties.

#### Survey of Minority-Owned Business Enterprises

This survey is conducted every five years as part of the economic censuses program for businesses owned by blacks, Spanish, Japanese, Chinese, Filipino, Hawaiian, Korean, and American Indian ancestry. Information is collected on number of firms and gross receipts, number of paid employees by geographic area, industry, size of firm, and form of organization. Geographic coverage includes U.S. total, states, selected SMSA's and counties, and cities.

#### Government Surveys

A number of annual and quarterly publications are compiled, based on periodic surveys of government. The greatest proportion of data focuses on public employment and payrolls for October of each year and revenue and expenditure of state and local governments for fiscal years.

#### General Revenue Sharing

This annual survey provides data on taxes and intergovernment revenues of approximately 38,000 general-purpose government areas used by the Office of Revenue Sharing (Department of the Treasury) as a factor in determining revenue sharing grants to each locality.

This survey, in addition to other programs (such as population estimate), provides data to assist in the calcula-

tion of local revenue sharing entitlement monies.

#### Health Surveys

The Census Bureau also conducts three health surveys for the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare: the Health Interview Survey, the Health Examination Survey, and the Hospital Discharge Survey. In addition to conducting interviews and transferring raw data to computer tape, the Bureau assists in survey planning and sample design. The National Center for Health Statistics is responsible for analyzing and publishing the data. Additional information on these surveys may be obtained from:

#### Health Interview Survey

Information is collected from approximately 48,000 households each year. The sample is representative of the entire civilian population, excluding those in institutions. The major purpose of the survey is to provide information on the health status of the population and the utilization of medical services. Data include population characteristics related to illness, injury, disability, and the cost and uses of medical services.

#### Health Examination Survey

This annual survey draws its sample from the civilian, non-institutionalized population by medical and dental examinations to characterize the population aged 1 to 74 years. In addition to socioeconomic data, the survey seeks to obtain diagnostic data on the prevalence of illness. Approximately 12,000 households are surveyed.

### Hospital Discharge Survey

The Hospital Discharge Survey is a continuous data collection survey. Information is transcribed from daily hospital records of a sample of short-stay and special hospitals in the U.S. Results are used to determine the nature and extent of illness diagnosed and treated in hospitals, as well as the amount of in-hospital care required relative to the final diagnosis and age of the patient.

### Current Medicare Survey

This survey is conducted by the Census Bureau for the Social Security Administration. Data on services and charges covered and not covered by Medicare are collected. This information includes education, geographic location, and other characteristics of patients to determine how widely Medicare is being used and to determine what changes may be needed in the program. ### Statistical Abstract of the United States

The Abstract, first issued in 1878, contains standard annual summaries of statistics on the social, political, and economic organization of the United States. A guide is also included to more than 1000 publications to provide additional sources of information.

Figures are generally national totals, although some data are provided for regions and individual States. Data for smaller areas are presented in various supplements to the Abstract including the Congressional District Data Book and the Pocket Data Book, U.S.A.

### Congressional District Data Book

Reports for the 94th Congress (1975-1976) cover the three States of California, New York, and Texas, that had redistricted prior to the 1974 elections. No district changes were made for the 95th (1977-78) Congress. One volume has been compiled for the 93rd Congress (1973-74).

Data are reported on population, housing, and election statistics for States, congressional districts, and places of 10,000 or more inhabitants. Maps showing congressional district boundaries are also included.

The Data Book is published after each decennial census with special reports released between censuses for only those States which have redistricted. A Congressional District Computer Profile, a computer-generated narrative profile, is also available for each district.

### County and City Data Book

This supplement to the Statistical Abstract presents data from the most recent censuses and from other government agencies and private sources. Statistics are presented for every county and city with a population of 25,000 or more, as well as for metropolitan areas, States, regions and census divisions. Published since 1947, the 1977 edition updated data from the last volume released in 1972.

Pocket Data Book, U.S.A.

This supplement to the Statistical Abstract is a condensation of statistics presented in the Abstract. A section of texts and charts on historical and current trends is also included.

Examples of specific subjects include fertility rates, birth expectations of wives, air pollution, Federal subsidies, juvenile court cases handled and energy projections, among others.

State and Central City Profiles

Reports in this series are comprised of individual computer-generated profiles for each State and for SMSA's identified in the 1970 census. Data for the central city of each SMSA are also included. The profiles include selected demographic, economic, and housing characteristics from the 1970 census. The report is written in narrative form.

Social Indicators 1976

This publication contains statistics from a number of Federal agencies presented in chart form with supporting text, technical notes, tables, and sources. The publication is the result of a combined effort by the Office of Management and Budget and the Bureau of the Census.

Data are divided into major categories to describe social conditions and trends in the United States. Available from the Government Printing Office, Indicators 1976 updates the

initial publication, Social Indicators 1973.

Data User News

This monthly newsletter, formerly titled Small-Area Data Notes, provides continuous reporting on plans for upcoming censuses, availability of statistical reports, announcements of workshops and conferences, user-oriented products and programs developed by the Bureau, applications of census data, and new computer programs. This newsletter is a major vehicle for communication to data users by the Census Bureau.

Factfinder for the Nation

This publication has been published periodically since 1976 as a series of topical brochures. Each brochure describes the range of census materials available on a specific subject. Subjects include minority statistics, availability of census records about individuals, population, housing, construction, retail and wholesale trade, etc. There is also a brochure on the history and organization of the Census Bureau.

Census Map Series

Because statistics are presented for specific geographic areas, the Bureau recognizes the need to provide maps to facilitate examination and comparison of statistics. Maps developed by the Bureau are used in Bureau field operations and publications; geographic coding systems which relate households to political and statistical areas; automated geographic files which provide references before they are collected and published in reports and graphic displays; and large maps which display statistics for the United States.

The Bureau also conducts an annual boundary and annexation survey to note territorial changes in cities, towns, and other administrative jurisdictions. Examples of maps available from the Census Bureau begin on the next page.

#### United States Maps

This series (GE-50) of 30 by 42 inch maps displays selected characteristics from the Bureau's various censuses. This is an open-ended map series to present data on various subjects at geographic levels as small as individual counties. Maps are usually in color.

#### Urban Atlas

This is a series (GS-80) that presents 12 tract maps for the 65 largest SMSA's at the time of the 1970 census. The Atlases serve as graphic supplements to individual Census Tract Reports (PHC-1). Atlas sheets measure 19 by 22 inches and are printed in color.


In many instances, the researcher needs an outline map in order to plot specific information other than that already provided by the Bureau. To meet this need, the Bureau has available two series of outline maps:





Government Manual - the official handbook of the Federal Government. It describes the purposes and programs of most government agencies and lists top personnel. (Stock #022-033-00917-5)

Federal Statistical Directory - designed to facilitate communications among Federal Offices working on statistical programs. It lists, by organizational units within each agency, the names, office addresses and telephone

numbers of key persons engaged in statistical and related activities. (Stock #041-001-00125-5)

Statistical Reporter - monthly periodical designed primarily for the interchange of information among government employees engaged in statistical and research activities. It includes notes on surveys and programs, major organizational changes, statistical publications, selected new forms approved under the Federal Reports Act, Federal statistical personnel, and other current developments in Federal statistics.

## APPENDICES



The Bureau of the Census has released extensive amounts of statistical information from the 1970 census and other censuses and surveys on computer tape. While anyone may purchase these tapes, many users find it more convenient and less expensive to turn for assistance to an organization which has already obtained and worked with the tapes. This listing is designed to help users locate organizations offering the statistical services they need.

The organizations listed here have advised the Census Bureau that they have tape files of data prepared by the Bureau and perform processing services for data users. The organizations, referred to as Summary Tape Processing Centers, are not franchised, established, or supported by the Bureau of the Census. They vary considerably with regard to the services they offer, fees for services, clientele eligible for service, and the subject content and geographic coverage of the tape files they hold. Codes, presented to the left of the addresses, indicate selected information about the centers.

**GEOGRAPHIC COVERAGE CODES.** The letters A through E are used to give a rough indication of the geographic coverage of each processing center's tape files. Since the extent of a center's holdings may vary according to summary tape series (e.g., a center might have First Count files for the U.S., but Fourth Count files for New England only), the notation used will reflect the geographic coverage of the most extensive tape series.

**SERVICES CODES.** Processing centers offer a variety of services. Most, for example, are willing to make copies of summary tapes and prepare printouts of census data. The Bureau often receives inquiries about two less widely available services: computer mapping or graphic and address matching/geocoding. In view of the level of interest in these services, processing centers which offer them are assigned these additional codes:

CM-Computer mapping or graphics  
 AM-Address matching/geocoding

**RESTRICTIONS CODE.** Several processing centers have indicated that their services are generally restricted to government, educational, and/or non-profit organizations. These centers are assigned the code "R."
